Submission to the Australian Law Reform Commission
Inquiry: Review of Surrogacy Laws

I wish to make a submission and request to be de-identified.

I am an Australian intended parent in my late 30s. I believe Australia should move towards a model of “Compensated Surrogacy,” which I view as a sub-category within Altruistic Surrogacy.

Under this model, surrogates would be permitted to receive a capped amount – beyond reimbursement of expenses – not as a “fee” or “incentive,” but as a gift from intended parents in recognition of the time, commitment, and emotional labour involved. For example, this could be in the range of \$1000 to 1500 AUD per month of pregnancy, or more if carefully regulated. The aim would be to support the surrogate without introducing financial motivation as the primary driver.

I support maintaining a clear distinction between compensated and commercial surrogacy and do not support moving towards a commercial model as seen in the US. However, I believe current laws that prohibit any form of compensation beyond expense reimbursement are unnecessarily restrictive and may deter otherwise willing surrogates.

A carefully designed model for Compensated Surrogacy would help more surrogates feel supported while preserving the core altruistic motivations – friendship, community, and a shared desire to grow families – that should underpin any surrogacy journey.

I feel that Australia has a solid framework, but I strongly believe a shift to Compensated Surrogacy – if regulated carefully, with sensible caps (to prevent it from being “Commercial Surrogacy”) – could help Australia lead the way when it comes to global best practice.
